**Trio Wanted For Questioning In a 2010 Uptown Murder**

NOPD's Cold Case Squad is asking for the public's assistance in locating 3 locals who may have critical information about an Uptown murder that happened in late 2010.

Detectives would like to speak to 56-year-old Glenn Porter, 56-year-old Mose Percy and 52-year-old Jennie Randolph about the shooting death of 79-year-old Curtis Miller, whose body was found inside his vehicle in the 2000 block of Toledano Street on Sunday October 17, 2010. Investigators say Porter, Percy and Randolph are not suspects in the case. They're simply "persons of interest."

Homicide Detective Harold Wischan is in charge of the investigation. Crimestoppers is offering up to a \$2,500 reward for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the person(s) responsible. Citizens with information regarding this crime are asked to call Crimestoppers at 822-1111 or toll free at 1-877-903-STOP (7867). Callers do not have to leave their name nor testify in court to receive the reward. Any person who, after the commission of a felony, shall harbor, conceal, or aid the offender, knowing or having reasonable ground to believe that he has committed the felony, and with the intent that he may avoid or escape from arrest, trial, conviction, or punishment shall be charged with R.S. 14:25; Relative to Accessories After the Fact. An accessory after the fact may be tried and punished, notwithstanding the fact that the principal felon may not have been arrested, tried, convicted, or amenable to justice. Whoever becomes an accessory after the fact shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars, or imprisoned, with or without hard labor, for not more than five years, or both; provided that in no case shall his punishment be greater than one-half of the maximum provided by law for a principal offender.
